Put Your Best Foot Forward — Creating a Winning Resume

When it comes to applying for a job, developing a strong resume will help you make a good first impression. A resume is your first opportunity to present your qualifications to prospective employers — a good one will increase your odds of being invited for an interview.

Here are a few tips for creating a resume that will help you stand out from the crowd:

- Write to the position. Describe your abilities and work history in terms directly related to the position
 and company to which you're applying. Describe significant accomplishments at current and previous
 jobs and explain how your contributions impacted the department or company's bottom line. This
 approach will demonstrate to prospective employers how you can play a part in the firm's success.
- **Be brief.** Simplify descriptions of the positions you've held and leave out non-vital information. Try to limit your resume to one page.
- Choose your words wisely. Begin statements with action verbs and avoid puns and wordplays. Limit the use of superfluous professional jargon, acronyms and abbreviations.
- Proofread carefully. Accurate spelling and proper grammar matter; careless errors indicate a lack of attention to detail.
- Create an e-resume. To make your resume Web-friendly, avoid columns and bullets, and limit the use
 of bold and italics. Include keyword search phrases that link to job responsibilities. Also save your
 document in ASCII (plain text) format, which can be clearly read by most computers.
- **Revise your resume regularly.** Even if you're not currently looking for a new position, update your resume as you gain experience. When an unexpected opportunity comes along, you'll be ready.


Today, Cupid and his arrows have become the most popular of love signs, and love is most frequently depicted by two hearts pierced by an arrow, Cupid's arrow.




BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Harriet Tubman helped hundreds of American slaves escape along the secret route to freedom known as the Underground Railroad. Born a slave herself, she fled from Maryland to freedom in Philadelphia in 1849. For the next 10 years she made repeated secret trips back to Maryland, leading over 300 escaped slaves north to freedom in Canada. During the Civil War she also served the Union as a scout, spy and nurse. Her success at shepherding others to safety earned her the nickname "the Moses of her People" and made her a lasting symbol of the American antislavery movement.

Extra credit: Though her birth name was Araminta, Tubman later took the first name of her mother, Harriet Ross... She married John Tubman, a freed slave, in 1844, but remained a slave herself until her escape in 1849.





Rosa Louise McCauley In 1955, Rosa Parks was an African-American living in Montgomery, Alabama -- a city with laws that strictly segregated blacks and whites. On 1 December 1955, after her day of work as a seamstress at a local department store, Parks boarded a city bus. When she refused to give up her seat to a white man, the bus driver called police, and Parks was arrested and fined. The resulting bus boycott by African-Americans, led by Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., caused a national sensation. The boycott was a success and led to desegregation in Montgomery and elsewhere in the United States. Over time, Parks became a national icon of civil rights and African-American pride. Parks worked as an aide to Michigan Congressman John Conyers, Jr. from 1966 until her retirement in 1988, and she founded the Rosa and Raymond Parks Institute for Self Development in 1987. She was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by Bill Clinton in 1996.

Extra credit: Parks married Raymond Parks, a barber, in 1932, and they remained married until his death in 1977. They had no children. Raymond Parks was born in 1903... Her hometown of Tuskegee, Alabama was home to the Tuskegee Institute, which was led for many years by Booker T. Washington. He died in 1915, two years after Parks was born... Parks's bus ride was reminiscent of Homer Plessy's refusal to leave an all-white rail car in Louisiana in 1892..
